








# **Southwest's Safety Corner**

A cable, a tether, a reason to be better. An argument for a kill switch

This past week, I witnessed a guy returning to his home in an older pontoon. about twenty feet with a mid -one hundreds horsepower Yamaha. He was coming in too fast. Just before I yelled, he slowed somewhat. He was now below my "yell threshold." I was working on the engines in the BossaNova, doing preventative maintenance. He went by my boathouse, under the pedestrian bridge, and stopped to talk to fellow pontooners waiting to leave under the bridge, as the passageway is only 12 feet wide.



I could no longer see the captain, but could see the boat. All of the sudden, I heard the wail of the mighty Yamaha. It veered to starboard, crashing into the bank and golf cart trail. The Yamaha, still straining its guts at WOT, propelled the aluminum craft then to port—within my line of sight it was heading to homes and boathouses filled with boats. I waited and waited and then heard the crash, now just out of my line of sight. I knew the guy only in a casual way as he walks his dog by my singlewide on a regular basis. Apparently no one was hurt, and no boats were destroyed, but this got me to thinking.

As a "mature boat owner" I'm not as steady on my feet as I

once was. Sometimes I fall. It would be easy to grab the wrong part of the controls on the way down to the floor.

Do I know exactly what happened? No, I do not. I did speak to both individuals involved, and the Captain said he was fine. I didn't have the guts to conduct an inquisition.

I do, however, see how this unfortunate scenario could play out with me.

It might be time for some of us to consider a kill switch. These are only required for the newest of boats built after January 2020 and below 26 feet, but can be retrofitted to all. However, not all of us want to be tethered so close to the dash of the boat...or tethered at all. There's times when we may need to set the anchor out, or retrieve a line. Maybe we need to be able to step away, yet still be protected if we fall in the water or on deck.

#### What to do? Fell Marine's MOB+ and ACR's OLAS

Guardian systems replace the tether with an electronic fob on our wrist and a paired receiver on the dash. Either system allows multiple fobs (capatain and passengers) and can manually be activated or automatically activated by immersion. Even a pet could have one attached to their life vest. If the "captain" fob is activated, the engine shuts off. If the "passenger" fob is activated, coordinates and notification are sent to the captain. There are other companies that also offer wireless tethering in addition to these two.
